The Associate Provost for Undergraduate Affairs & Special Programs serves on the Provost's senior leadership team and has primary responsibility for undergraduate academic affairs across the George Washington University, encompassing over 11,000 undergraduates in eight schools. The Associate Provost also supervises the directors of two Living and Learning Communities – the University Honors Program (~500 students) and the Elizabeth J. Somers Women's Leadership Program (~100 students). A dozen full-time faculty teaching in these programs report directly to the Associate Provost.

Selected Responsibilities and Accomplishments

- Leadership role in university strategic planning process in FY25 and FY26, co-chairing the Innovation Committee and serving on the Steering Committee
- Convene and set agenda for monthly meetings of academic deans across eight schools to formulate policy, coordinate operations, and maintain strong working relationships with the Office of the Provost.
- Convene and set agenda for monthly meetings of 80+ undergraduate academic advisors to address challenges, share best practices, facilitate cross-school coordination, and promote consistent policies across the schools.
- Drafted Provost's Guidelines for Using Generative Artificial Intelligence (GAI) to assist faculty setting policies for their courses concerning proper student use of GAI tools.
- Contribute to the University's reaccreditation process with the Middle States Commission on Higher Education, serving on the Working Group for Standard IV – Support of the Student Experience.
- Redesigned and oversaw implementation of a streamlined process for assigning first-year students to class registration slots, reducing staff workload and student anxiety and accounting for international time zones.
- Developed and implemented improved criteria for recognizing 200+ upperclassmen for Outstanding Academic Achievement, accounting for grade distribution differences across schools and academic divisions within schools.
- Co-chaired Student Retention and Academic Performance Task Force and oversaw transition to proctored online math placement testing to improve accuracy of test scores as predictors of success, in cooperation with the Office of Student Success, resulting in improved DFW rates in gateway courses.
- Partnered over several months with the Division of Student Affairs, Office of the Registrar, Office of Admissions, deans, and advising directors to assess the feasibility of a new, multi-session summer orientation model for new students, addressing the concerns of all stakeholders, ultimately planning and launching the new model in 2025.
- Serve ex officio on the Faculty Senate Committee on Educational Policy & Technology, explain decisions of the central administration, and take collaborative action in response to concerns raised by senators.
- Expeditiously address appeals of academic decisions to the central administration, triaging, channeling, and resolving as appropriate (e.g., complaints about instructors; irregular degree clearance requests, etc.). Serve as the provost's delegated appellate officer in appeals from the verdicts of Academic Integrity panels and the Committee on Late Withdrawals.

- Arranged and moderated three discussions with faculty representing a wide range of viewpoints in the tumultuous Spring of 2024, during which student protesters occupied University property.
- Co-facilitated, with the Deputy Provost, a series of conversations with representatives of the Student Coalition for Palestine in Summer 2024.
- Designed and implemented a program enabling eighteen international students experiencing visa delays in 2025 to matriculate and stay current with coursework on a temporary basis from their country of origin.
- Selected by the Provost based on leadership expertise to facilitate the GW Academic Leadership Academy (GWALA). GWALA is a yearlong professional development fellowship program for faculty who aspire to serve in administrative leadership positions. Previously, GWALA was facilitated by the Vice Provost for Faculty Affairs.
- Served on search committees for various positions including Dean of the School of Business, Dean of the School of Public Health, Associate Provost for Academic Planning and Assessment, Assistant Dean for the Mount Vernon Campus, Senior Associate Registrar, Deputy Registrar, Director of the Center for Undergraduate Fellowships & Research, and the Associate Vice Provost for Student Success.

Associate Dean for Graduate Studies, 2014–19

The Columbian College of Arts and Sciences is the largest college at the George Washington University. The Associate Dean for Graduate Studies is responsible for an \$11 million student support budget, graduate student enrollment of 2,900+, generating annual revenue of ~\$75 million across 81 programs on five campuses and three schools within the college (Trachtenberg School of Public Policy and Public Administration; Corcoran School of the Arts and Design; School of Media and Public Affairs). The associate dean manages a staff of twenty admissions professionals, program coordinators, recruiters, and award specialists. They have primary responsibility for increasing net graduate tuition revenue while enhancing selectivity. As a member of the dean's senior staff, they advise the dean of the college, participate in deliberation and policy-making. They instruct and advise department chairs, directors of graduate programs, and members of thesis committees. They are responsible for evaluating, revising, and enforcing academic policies.

- Increased applications by 12% from 2015–19.
- Increased students matriculating by 5.6% from 2015–19.
- Achieved 41% increase in committed applicants from underrepresented minorities in 2017.
- Achieved 9% increase in international applicants in 2017.
- Launched eight new graduate programs, including Applied Economics; Data Science; Environmental Chemistry; Decorative Arts and Design History; Communication Management.
- Designed and implemented strategic tuition award protocol for revenue-generating degree programs.
- Developed data-driven, program-specific guidelines for risk management when over-offering awards.
- Conceived and implemented pipeline partnership with Minority-Serving Institutions (e.g., HBCUs, Hispanic-Serving Institutions).
- Designed and implemented travel reimbursement program for 100+ applicants from diverse backgrounds.

- Oversaw transition of college to new university platform for managing prospects and applications (Salesforce/TargetX).
- Negotiated, drafted, and oversaw implementation of memoranda of understanding between college, individual departments and programs, and external entities.
- Oversaw integration of three graduate programs from Corcoran School of Art during acquisition and incorporation into college.
- Served on national steering committee of Edward A. Bouchet Graduate Honor Society for minority doctoral candidates; select new members; attend annual conference at Yale University.
- Served as institutional liaison for Xavier University's BUILD Grant (Building Infrastructure Leading to Diversity) from the National Institutes of Health.
- Launched four new funding initiatives: graduate instructorship; dissertation completion fellowship; graduate research travel grants; Columbian Fellowships for doctoral students.
- Participated in selection of winners of competitive fellowships at college and university levels.
